

The Structure of Personality

The Id – Reservoir of Psychic Energy

- Most primitive part of the mind; what we are born with
- Source of all drives and urges
- Operates according to the pleasure principle and primary process thinking

The Ego- Executive of Personality

- The part of the mind that constrains the id to reality
- Develops around 2-3 years of age
- Operates according to the reality principle and secondary process thinking
- Mediates between id, superego, and environment

The Superego- Upholder of Values and Ideals

- The part of the mind that internalizes the values, morals, and ideals of society
- Develops around age 5
- Not bound by reality

Definition:

Defense mechanism is pattern of adjustment through which an individual relieves or decreases anxieties caused by an uncomfortable situation that threatens self-esteem.

Functions of Defense Mechanism:

- Protecting individuals from dangerous situations
- Removing anxiety and hurt
- Plays an important role in normal adjustment mechanisms.

Classification of Ego Defense Mechanism

Denial

Arguing against an anxiety provoking stimuli by stating it doesn't exist.



Example: Denying that your physician's diagnosis of cancer is correct and seeking a second opinion

Displacement

Taking out impulses on a less threatening target from original source.



Example: After parental scolding, a young girl takes her anger out on her little brother.

Projection

Attributing one's own thought, feelings or motives to another



Example: A woman who dislikes her boss thinks she likes her boss but feels that the boss doesn't like her.
